These new biographies in the CHRISTIAN HEROES: THEN & NOW series share the lives and ministries of two men who made it a priority over the years to "Send the Light" - the theme of our Missions Conference this year.

Clarence Jones: Mr. Radio

His work began in Chicago where he helped pioneer something unheard of - Christian radio broadcasts. God then led Clarence to Ecuador where he co-founded Radio HCJB. His legacy of broadcasting the light of the gospel to the ends of the earth still soars on the airwaves today.

Brother Andrew: God's Secret Agent

Redeemed by God after serving with the Dutch Resistance against Nazi occupation, this Dutchman became a daring messenger of hope, smuggling Scripture through closed borders and equipping persecuted Christians behind the Iron Curtain. Today Brother Andrew's ministry continues to shine the light of Christ in the world's darkest places.

Some of the most read books in the library are from the above series written for older children, teens, and adults. A new series, HEROES FOR YOUNG READERS, is based on and adapted from CHRISTIAN HEROES. Each easy-to-read book provides a condensed biography in a rhyming poem format and is filled with colorful illustrations.

Amy Carmichael: Rescuing the Children

Her encounter with a poor girl her age when she was still a child changed the course of her life. When Amy grew up, God used her, first in the slums on Northern Ireland and then in India, to rescue hundreds of women and children from poverty, oppression, and life without Christ.

George Müller: Faith to Feed Ten Thousand

The people of Bristol, England, thought God had more important things to care about than orphans, but George, and soon the orphans themselves, knew that wasn't true. Homes, food, education, and love - God provided it all as they trusted Him!

The Age of Accountability

Jesus made it very clear that children are special. When His disciple rebuked those who wanted Jesus to pray over their children, He said, Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 19:14). Again, when the disciples were fretting over who would be the greatest in the kingdom, Jesus called a Ittle child unto him, and set him in the midst of them, And said, Verily I say unto you, Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoso shall receive one such little child in my name receiveth me. But whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea. (Matthew 18:1-6).

But are children special enough that God does not hold them accountable for their sin? Is there an age to which children must attain before God will condemn them to hell? Is there really an age of accountability which safeguards infants and young children from the wrath of God?

The phrase "age of accountability" is no where found in the Bible. But neither is the term "trinity." The absence of a word from Scripture does not mean the concept cannot be found. We certainly believe in the trinity, so why not believe in the age of accountability if it can be observed by principle or by description in the inspired Word of God?

Children Are Sinners

We must acknowledge first of all that children are included in the statement of Romans 3:23, For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God. In this verse, the word all is very clear. Children are not excepted. Psalm 51:5 adds to this: Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me. The word translated "shapen" (Strong's number 02342) is used of God forming the earth in creation (Psalm 90:2), and of God's hands forming the crooked serpent (Job 26:13). In Psalm 51:5 it is used to describe how God forms a child in the womb (compare Psalm 139:15-16), and clearly states that even while a child is not yet fully grown in the womb he already possesses his inheritance from Adam: a nature

contaminated with iniquity, the will to sin. Psalm 51:5 also says that the child is conceived in sin. This expression is not suggesting that the act between husband and wife which results in the conception of a child is a sinful act. Rather, it clarifies that not only is a child a sinner as his body is being formed in the womb, but he is a sinner from the very moment his life begins in conception.

Children exhibit their sin nature from the moment of birth. God explains that one way we demonstrate our sin nature is by insisting upon going our own way: *All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way...* (Isaiah 53:6). From a child's earliest means of expressing himself, he shows this desire to have his own way.

As a child grows, he continues to exhibit this selfish tendency of the sin nature and repeatedly proves that by nature he is a sinner. The need to instruct children to obey reinforces this fact. In Ephesians 6:1, God says, *Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right.* The point is that you must tell children to obey because they will generally not do so on their own. But it is also necessary to teach children the difference between right and wrong, because they will probably not figure that out on their own either.

At what point do children consciously choose wrong over right?

To do wrong is one thing, but to be conscious that you are doing wrong is another. For this reason, God said in James 4:17, *Therefore to him that* **knoweth to do good, and doeth it not**, to him it is sin. He then tells us that there is a time in a child's life before which he knows to do good: For before the child shall know to refuse the evil and choose the good...(Isaiah 7:16).

The big question is then, at what point in a child's life does he know to do good but chooses not to do good? Or, at what point in a child's life does he know to refuse the evil and to choose the good? Is this then the age of accountability? Does God not hold children accountable for their sin because they do not yet know to refuse the evil and choose the good, even though they are sinners and possess a sin nature from the moment of conception?

We look first for some insight on this matter to the event of the death of David's son by Bathsheba. David's sin with Bathsheba left her with child, but some time after the child was born it became deathly ill. When the child died, David made a statement that indicates the child would definitely go to paradise where David would join him later: But now he is dead, wherefore should I fast? Can I bring him back again? I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me (2 Samuel 12:23). Many take comfort in these words when infants die. But is there also comfort here for those who mourn the death of older children? We must ask this question: how long after David's child was born did he become sick unto death? Almost everyone assumes that the child was an infant when this occurred. But the entire event is compressed into a few verses of Scripture and may, in fact, have occurred over a longer period of time.

The Hebrew words used in the context for the English term "child" may help us understand. In the entire context, the English word "child" is used 13 times. One time "child" is translated from the Hebrew "ben" (S.N. 01121). This is a non-age-specific term that refers to a child as a son, a male child. It is used 2,978 times in the Old Testament and never once translated as "infant" or "babe." Eleven times the English word "child" is translated from "yeled" (S.N. 03206). This is another non-age-specific term that refers to a person as someone's child. It might be used by a 60 year old referring to their adult child or by a 20 year old referring to their infant child. It is used 72 times in the Old Testament and is used variously of children of different ages. One time in the above context, the English word "child" is translated from "na'ar" (S.N. 05288). This word is used 76 times in the Old Testament and predominantly is used to refer to older children, perhaps of teenage years. It is used just a couple of times to refer to an infant. For example, in Exodus 2:6, na'ar is used of Moses at the age of three months when his mother hid him in a basket in the bulrushes. But na'ar is also the word used in Genesis 22:3 when Abraham took two of his young men (na'ar) with him to sacrifice his son Isaac whom Abraham refers to as a lad with the same term (na'ar, S.N. 05288). Na'ar is used 238 times in the Old Testament. It is translated "young man" 76 times, "servant" 54 times, "child" 44 times, "lad" 33 times, "young" 16 times, "children" 7 times, "youth" six times, "boys" 1 time, and "babe" 1 time. The overwhelming evidence of its usage suggests that David's son that died might have been of a much greater age than an infant. How old exactly is impossible to know, but it is certainly possible this child was older than a toddler.

It is this same Hebrew word, "na'ar" (S.N. 05288), that is used in Isaiah 7:16 that tells us there is

a time before the child (na'ar) shall know to refuse the evil and choose the good.... If the use of the word "na'ar" here refers to "babe" as in the case of Moses, then we are to understand that infants are the ones who are not able to make conscious moral choices. On the other hand, if "na'ar" here refers to a "lad" as in the case of Isaac, or a "young man" as in the case of Abraham's servant, then we are to understand that even a child of a teen age struggles with understanding how to make legitimate moral choices.

We must not assume that just because a child has the ability to repeat moral statements he fully comprehends what those words mean. Neither must we assume that a child of immature years fully comprehends the ramifications of moral choices he might make. Learning terms is a lot easier than learning the concepts those terms suggest. Some concepts may take years of experience and application for children to fully assimilate into their moral conscience.

To give Biblical support for this, let us look at Israel's wandering in the wilderness. The reason for the wandering was Israel's unbelief. The duration of 40 years was to facilitate the death of an entire generation who had failed to trust God's Word. But all those under the age of 20 were given a pass and not held accountable. Numbers 14:29 says, Your carcases shall fall in this wilderness; and all that were numbered of you, according to your whole number, from twenty years old and upward, which have murmured against me. Were there no 19 year olds who murmured against God? No 18 year olds? No 17 year olds? Why did God use the age of 20 as the cut off for accountability? When God first established the Law with Israel at Mt. Sinai, He included a ransom that must be paid for each individual. This was considered atonement money, a ransom for his soul unto the LORD. But only those who were 20 years old and above were required to pay. No one under the age of 20 needed to pay a ransom for his soul unto the LORD (Exodus 30:11-16). Furthermore, a man had to be 20 years old before he could go forth to war (Numbers 1:3). Could it possibly be that the age of accountability is 20 in the eyes of God?

We are still left with an ambiguous conclusion. When the Bible says that to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin (James 4:17), and then says there is a time before the child shall know to refuse the evil and choose the good...(Isaiah 7:16), there is a clear indication that the child who does not know to do good and who does not know to

refuse the evil will not be held accountable for his sin in the day of God's eternal judgment. However, we cannot draw an absolute conclusion as to what age a child's accountability begins. We can be comfortable in the belief that infants are below the age of accountability. We **might be** equally comfortable in believing that children as old as 19 are below the age of accountability. But we cannot know with certainty.

Whenever God leaves something like this unclear, He does so for a reason. One reason may well be that the age of accountability is different for each child. Children mature at different rates. If God were to give us a more exact age for accountability, we might in our human finiteness give one child a pass who should be held accountable while we might hold another child accountable when he still lacks the ability to comprehend the consequences of his actions. Another reason for God leaving the age of accountability undefined is that He alone is the judge of men's hearts. It is not up to us to say who goes to heaven and who goes to hell. That is a privilege reserved exclusively for God. He alone knows whether or not a person knows to do good and doeth it not. He alone is able to see in a person's heart whether his profession of faith is genuine and then to witness with the spirit of man that he is a truly born again child of God.

How Is It Possible That A Child Could Go To Heaven Without Receiving Christ?

The only reason anyone may be saved is because Jesus Christ paid for his sin on Calvary's cross and conquered death for him in His resurrection. It is the grace of God that delivers regeneration to a person when he believes in Jesus Christ and receives Him as his Savior.

But what if a person is not mentally capable of believing? Is he automatically excluded for the absence of faith in his heart even though faith is neither a mental nor a volitional option for a young child, or for that matter, for a mentally challenged person of any age?

Consider the language of John chapter 3 in regards to belief and unbelief. John 3:18 say, He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. Each word "believe" in this verse comes from the same Strong's number, 4100, "pisteuo", to believe, to

put trust in. On the one hand, there is active belief in Christ for salvation, and on the other hand there is the simple absence of faith that leaves a man eternally condemned.

Then we look at John 3:36 where it says, He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him. Here the word "believeth" comes again from Strong's number 4100, "pisteuo". However, the word "believeth not" comes from Strong's number 544, "apeitheo", not to allow one's self to be persuaded, to refuse or withhold belief and/or obedience. According to this verse, there is still an active belief in Christ that is necessary for salvation. But the opposite is not simply the absence of faith. Rather, it is an active refusal to believe. It is a conscious determination of the will of man to reject Christ and withhold belief no matter what.

This active disbelief of John 3:36 raises an interesting question. If a young child dies before he has the conscious ability to exercise faith in Jesus Christ, or if a young child or any mentally challenged person dies without the conscious ability to actively disbelieve in Jesus Christ, does God still condemn that person to an eternity in the lake of fire? Jesus Christ did die for their sin. He did pay the price for their redemption. Does God have the prerogative to apply that redemption to those who do not have the mental capacity to call upon the name of the Lord and believe in Jesus Christ? Does God have the prerogative as a Sovereign God to apply that redemption upon those who do not have the mental capacity to consciously reject faith in Jesus Christ?

Any reasonable examination of David's words in 2 Samuel 12:23 would bring a person to conclude that God not only has the prerogative to grant redemption to young children who do not have the mental maturity to fully comprehend either saving faith or condemning disbelief, but that He actually does so. When illness threatened the life of David's son, David sought God for the child in the hope that God might spare him. During that time of agony, David would not listen to his servants' voices, he would not raise himself up from the earth, and he would not eat bread. He sought God with great intensity and vexation (2 Samuel 12:16-18). As soon as David understood the child was dead, his countenance improved considerably. Then David arose from the earth, and washed, and anointed himself, and changed his apparel, and came into the house of the LORD, and worshipped: then he came to his own house; and

when he required, they set bread before him, and he did eat (verse 20). His servants were amazed and inquired about this tremendous improvement in David's composure especially in light of the fact that David's son had died! It is to this that David gives these remarkable words, While the child was yet alive, I fasted and wept: for I said, Who can tell whether God will be gracious to me, that the child may live? But now he is dead, why should I fast? Can I bring him back again? I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me (2 Samuel 12:22-23). Where would David go to be with his son? David counted himself among the redeemed (Psalm 31:5). He believed in the resurrection (Psalm 49:15). He believed he would live in the presence of God for eternity (Psalm 23:6). David no doubt believed that his son had gone to paradise and that it was in this place of the redeemed that he would be reunited with his son. By contrast, he did not have the same sentiment upon the death of his When news came to David that son Absalom. Absalom had died, he mourned deeply for his lost son, even going so far as to say, Would God I had died for thee, O Absalom, my son, my son! (2 Samuel 18:33). David did not have the same confidence in Absalom's redemption as he did for the son of Bathsheba. He mourned upon the death of his adult son, but was comforted in the death of his young son. testimony of David suggests that God sovereignly bestows redemption upon those who do not have the capacity to actively believe or consciously disbelieve in the Savior.

God has a book which is called the Book of Life. In it are the names of all those who possess eternal life. Whosoever is not found written in the book of life will be cast into the lake of fire (Revelation 20:15). It appears that names were written in and excluded from the book of life from the foundation of the world (Revelation 17:8). We are also told that names are blotted out of the book of life (Revelation 3:5 with Revelation 22:19). From the foundation of the world, God knows what will happen to each person who is conceived in the womb. He knows that some will never make it alive out of the womb. He knows that some will survive on earth just a very short time after their birth. He knows that some will never develop the mental capacity to consciously reject Jesus Christ as their Savior. In His sovereign grace, it appears that for all these folks, God writes their names in the book of life from the foundation of the world and never has a reason to remove them.

If Children Are Not Accountable, Why Teach Them The Gospel?

We might wonder about the need to teach the gospel of Christ to young children if they are not accountable to God at that age. We might reason that we could just let them be children and enjoy their innocence until they are capable of comprehending the concepts of redemption and regeneration. But there are some very good reasons we should not wait to tell very young children the truth.

Children are inquisitive, and are always asking questions. In light of this, God told the Israelites that whenever their children asked questions of spiritual matters, the parents were to give them a full explanation. So when a son inquired about the meaning of the Passover, a father was to be ready with an answer (Exodus 13:14). And when a son asked about the testimonies and statutes and judgments of the LORD, a father was to be prepared to explain (Deuteronomy 6:20). Or when their children asked about the meaning of a stone monument set up after the crossing of the Jordan river, parents were to use that as an opportunity to teach their children about God (Joshua 4:6,21). Nothing was to be held back just because children were young.

Young children are constantly in a learning mode. The things they learn as children lay a foundation for what they will believe and live by when they grow older. Timothy knew the holy Scriptures from his childhood (2 Timothy 3:15), and became an effective pastor of a local church. David testified that God had taught him from his youth and from that young age he was able to declare God's wondrous works (Psalm 71:17). Even a young man can cleanse his way by taking heed to the Word of God (Psalm 119:9). And Jesus proclaimed, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God (Luke 18:16).

Just because children may not be held accountable to the wrath of God, does not mean they are incapable of grasping the simple truths of the gospel to which they can lay hold with an infant faith. It is so much better for children to begin their lives with a simple faith that can grow and mature than to live their childhood in an ignorance that may ultimately harden their hearts to the truth in the passage of time. We must preach the gospel to children to point their lives in the right direction as soon as possible.

Besides, there is a point at which children become accountable. Ecclesiastes 11:9-10 says, Rejoice, O young man, in thy youth; and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth, and walk in the ways of thine heart, and in the sight of thine eyes: but know thou, that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment. Therefore remove sorrow from thy heart, and put away evil from thy flesh: for childhood and youth are vanity. The truth is we do not know when accountability begins in any child's life. We cannot take the chance of waiting too long. We must give each child the gospel as early as possible so that when they do become accountable they may already be safe in the household of faith. Jesus testified that children are capable of believing in Him (Matthew 18:6). We should not be like the disciples and forbid them the opportunity.

Conclusion

God is sovereignly wise, gracious, and merciful. In these attributes, He has given us a hint of an age of accountability for children. Whenever a child dies, whether in the womb, in infancy, or at a young age, we may take comfort in believing that in God's sovereign wisdom, grace, and mercy, He knows what to do with these children in death. But the fulness of understanding about this matter God has reserved for Himself. It is left to us to trust the judgment of God and to believe that He makes no mistakes.

The Elders met on June 26 and on July 31. Each time we read through a chapter in Proverbs and prayed for the needs of our church family.

We rejoiced that our missionaries, Moises and Rosa Campos, desired to have North Hills Bible Church as their home church here in the States, so we approved a recommendation to the congregation to accept them as members. (This was approved by the congregation on Sunday July 1.)

Some folks in the congregation have expressed interest in making a missions trip to Spain next summer. We gave our blessing to this endeavor and approved Nate Moss to head up the planning for such a trip.


We discussed some needs of our missionaries and made some distributions out of our missions projects fund. This have been or will be noted in the weekly bulletin.

In the event that the church van may be used for the transportation of people to church for services or activities, we established some policies to insure that this is done well.

- 1. When children are being transported to the church in the church van, at least two adults from the church must be riding in the van: the driver plus at least one other
- 2. Children who are not accompanied by a parent or guardian must be at least six years old to be transported to the church on the church van.
- 3. In the event that a minor child, six years old or older, desires to be transported to the church in the church van, a permission slip must first be secured from a parent or guardian which shall state the following: "I give my permission for my child to ride in the church van and attend services at North Hills Bible Church. I promise to be home when my child returns."

The Trustees recommended to the Elder Board that we purchase a new sign for the front of our church property. The cost will be \$5,869.57 plus tax. (Rules have changed as to what our church tax exemption applies.) The Elders approved the purchase of this sign. This will require the obtaining of permits, the demolition of the current sign, some electrical work, and the construction of the new sign. All of this will take some time, but it should prove to be a great asset as there is a considerable amount of traffic that passes by the front of our church property. We praise the Lord that the finances are available in our reserve fund.


Master Glubs


